Early Voting Oct. 8 – Nov. 4th

Early voting in Marion county has begun! As of October 8, 2024 all register voters are able to vote at any early voting polling station.

In Plain Sight

Election Day is Nov. 5, 2024! Polls will be open from 6am to 6pm on Election Day. Voters will need to make sure they have their drivers license or another form of photo ID. It is also worth considering to bring proof of residence material. If you do not have a photo ID you can visit the license branch and directly inform them that you need a government ID so that you can vote.

Voter suppression has resulted in fewer polling stations each year. For that reason you may experience longer wait times in line. Allow ample time to get through the line so that you can vote before 6pm local time.

Overflow of Grace

On September 21, 2024 Antioch Fountain of Grace provided over \$5,000 of food and household supplies to people in the community.

Food insecurity within the city of Indianapolis is a social justice issue requiring systemic action. Indianapolis City Council recently voted in favor of a \$1.6 billion budget which plans to allocate about 3% of the budget to the office of public health and safety responsible for community nutrition and food.

Federal Judge Halts Indiana Law Requiring 25-Foot Buffer Around Police

Judge James Sweeney issued a preliminary injunction on September 27, 2024 halting the enforcement the law requiring a 25 foot buffer between on-duty law enforcement officers and bystanders. This injunction is based on Sweeney's belief that there is compelling evidence that the law is unconstitutional.
